Additional Information about the Medication Administration Training (MAT) for Child Care Providers

What is the Medication Administration Training (MAT) course for providers?

The MAT is an 8-hour competency-based course approved by the Board of Nursing and VDSS to train providers who work in child day programs to safely administer medication to children. Staff members who work in licensed or regulated child day programs *and* who give **prescription drugs** to children are *required* by the *Code of Virginia* to satisfactorily complete the training course, which includes passing written and practical examinations. The course must be facilitated by an *approved* MAT Trainer. **Class size is limited to 8 participants.**

What is the purpose of the Medication Administration Training (MAT) course for providers?

The MAT course certifies providers to administer medication in child day programs using the following routes: oral, topical, inhaled, nebulized, medicated patches, eye, ear, nose, and emergency injection of epinephrine using an auto-injector device.

Who is eligible to take the Medication Administration Training (MAT) provider course?

All child care providers working in child day programs are eligible to take the MAT course. Providers in the process of becoming registered or licensed are also eligible to attend the course. Currently, there are approximately 11,500 center-based and home-based child day programs in Virginia. One or more individuals in each of these facilities would need training if they choose to administer medication to children in their program.

Can the MAT certification be used to administer medication in settings other than child day programs?

No. The certification is valid only for providers who administer medication in child day programs during the normal course of business and in accordance with the program's written policy on medication administration.

For how long is the MAT provider certification valid?

The MAT certification is valid for three years from the date of issuance. The provider must complete a recertification training approved by VDSS in order to be certified for an additional three-year period. An annual interim refresher training practice demonstration is also required.

Once a provider is certified, does he/she have to obtain any additional training beyond the initial Medication Administration Training (MAT) course to be able to administer medication in a child day program?

Yes. All providers certified to administer medication must hold valid cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) *and* first aid certifications prior to administering any medication.

Our exception (54.1-3408.N) to the Drug Control Act requires medication administration training ONLY for prescription medications. Therefore all child day programs (with the exception of licensed child day centers) can give any non-prescription medication without attending training. The *Standards for Licensed Child Day Centers* contain a regulation that goes beyond the requirements of the law and requires medication administration training for anyone to administer prescription AND non-prescription medications.
